Masonic Spirituality

Recently, I began to use a wrist watch that serves also as a blood pressure gauge and a monitor of the steps I take each day. It is a useful device, one that helps me stay in contact with some of my bodily rhythms, as well as my exercise program. It also gives me feedback. When I reach 5,000 steps, a signal goes off - a pleasant enough sound that informs me that I have achieved an important goal.

After reaching my latest 5,000 step goal, I began to wonder whether anyone had ever recorded the number of steps it takes to circumambulate a lodge room, particularly during the three degrees of Masonry. Surely someone has calculated such an important number. Candidates, however, might be forbidden from wearing the kind of device that might tell them precisely the number of steps their Masonic journey might take. But there is never any doubt that the steps we take in our Masonic ascent are vitally important.

Most religions have spiritual traditions, writings and practices that explore the ascent of the spirit toward wisdom and perfection. Freemasonry is no different. Masonry presents its initiates with a very practical ascent through its degree system toward a figurative ascent to maturity and understanding. This is very akin to what the great mystics have taught for millenia. The

eminent Spanish mystic, John of the Cross, wrote that novices "...begin with a person's initial steps in the service of God and continue until the ultimate state of perfection is reached." John wrote about three levels of spiritual development: beginner (purgative), proficient (illuminative), and unitive (beatific). These steps might well describe the three degrees of Masonry.


Ascent is a prominent theme among ascetical or spiritual theologians. Some describe the ascent toward spiritual enlightenment akin to climbing a mountain. The Ascent of Mount Carmel, by John of the Cross, is but one example. Like a flight of winding stairs, the spiritual ascent describes an often arduous journey upward. But the rewards upon attaining the destination are rich indeed.

Whatever our religious tradition, Freemasonry offers its own unique examples of spiritual ascent. Sometimes, as every ascetical theologian would attest, that journey is taken in darkness, or sometimes in blinding light. But always, despite all difficulties and dangers, the journey toward perfection is often its own reward. Count on all the Masonic steps.

"Thank you for joining me today. We will continue to live stream and record our meetings for those who are not able to join us," welcomed the Grand Master. "Among those joining us today are the Brethren from our lodges in Chile, Panama, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and Tokyo, Japan. Thank you for tuning in and welcome."

The Grand Master called the Brethren to their feet for the colors, presented by the Knights of St. Andrew. With hands over hearts and saluting, the Grand Master and the Brethren recited the Pledg of Allegiance to the flag and sang the National Anthem.

The Brethren sang "Faith of our Father," as Grand Chaplain Rt. Wor. Hank Peirce, Grand Chaplain, offered this prayer:

Almighty God, to whom people in all living faiths lift up their hearts, from the depths of our need and in the greatness of hope, we lift up our hearts this day.

Once again we find ourselves at our Quarterly meeting and ask that you bless us and all who lead this ancient institution with a full course of wisdom.

Bless all assembled with us today in person and on-line. Source of all good, we thank You for the faith we have inherited in all its rich variety. We thank you for a land of freedom where citizens can speak their minds.

We thank You for the friendship that this Fraternity creates, and for those Brothers who look kindly upon us even when we fail and who help to bring us back to our bravest selves again. 

The Grand Master Bro. presented the Henry Price Medal to Brigadier General (Ret.) John J. Driscoll.

"I am delighted to welcome two Brothers in attendance today from our District in Panama," said the Grand Master. "Rt. Wor. Albert C. Hopper, District Grand Master and Wor. Eduardo Crocamo, Deputy District Grand Master."

The Grand Master introduced the attending Past Grand Masters: M. Wors. Albert Timothy Ames, Arthur E. Johnson (online), Donald Gardner Hicks, Jr., Jeffrey Black Hodgdon, Richard James Stewart, Harvey John Waugh, Paul Fulton Gleason, as well as the first responders, and the technical crews handling the sound and video streaming.

M. Wor. Bro. Ames rose to give an explanation of voting in Grand Lodge, prior to which he thanked all Brethren for the care and concern he received during his recent hospitalization. M. Wor. Bro. Ames then gave a report on the Recognition of Proxies and presented the Budget, which had been distributed to the Brethren. Both were accepted by vote.

Rt. Wor. W. Warren Richardson reported on the Records Committee. After which, Rt. Wor. Robert V. Jolly, Jr. reported that two lodges' bylaws changes were accepted. Both were accepted by vote.

Rt. Wor. Bro. Ames rose to announce a petition for consolidation of Pilgrim Lodge and Universal Lodges. If approved, they would operate under the Pilgrim Lodge charter and name. This petition was approved by vote.

Rt. Wor. John F. Sullivan, Deputy Grand Master, remembered the passing of two Brothers taking with them to the Celestial Lodge above their nearly 120 years of Masonic experience. Rt. Wor. Seth Landau, Grand Chaplain, led the Brethren in prayer, in which some phrases were in Hebrew and translated.

The Grand Master announced his candidates for Junior Grand Warden: Rt. Wor. Christopher Anthony Tonini, PDDGM, District 31, Chairman of the Golden Gavels 2022, and Rt. Wor. Alfredo Jorge Rodrigues Canhoto, PDDGM, District 15N, Strategic Planning Committee Chairman. For Senior Grand Warden, he announced Rt. Wor. John Emerson Kelley, Jr., PDDGM, District 13, Grand Marshal, as the lone candidate. Profiles from the candidates

are on page 12.

The Grand Master continued, "It is always sad when I must take action to remove an unsuitable man from our Fraternity. It is, unquestionably, the most heart-wrenching function I must perform. But it must be done. All of us, as Masons, have a duty to see that the Ancient Landmarks, Rules, Regulations, and our Grand Constitutions are preserved and that Brothers who are acting in a manner that is harmful to the Fraternity are given good counsel if appropriate, or a much more severe sanction if needed."

"We must never forget that to preserve the reputation of Freemasonry is the duty of every Freemason. We should also remember that a single unsuitable man within our ranks will drive dozens of good quality men away. If we see someone violating the basic principles of our Ancient Craft, if we see someone acting outside of the standards of morality, if we see someone doing things as a Mason that puts Freemasonry in a poor light, then we MUST, if it is minor enough, whisper good counsel in our Brother's ear. This is our duty to him, and our duty to Freemasonry."

"If it is not minor, or if he refuses to amend his behavior, then we MUST take firm action to remove him from our lodges, either temporarily or permanently. None of this is easy. We don't want to do it."

He announced the suspension of three men and the expulsion of another. The Grand Master's actions were approved by vote.

He announced that the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Japan, M. Wor. Jimmy Vitug Gipson, is "an Honorary Member of our Grand Lodge. M. Wor. Bro. Gipson [online], I am honored to call you my friend and Brother. Welcome to the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts."

The Grand Master was pleased to announce a new Commission for Grand Representative, Rt. Wor. Andrew Chung Wai MacKinlay, Grand Representative of The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts near the Grand Lodge of Japan. Rt. Wor. Bro. MacKinlay is a member of Sinim Lodge, located in Tokyo, Japan. "Thank you, Rt. Wor. Bro. MacKinlay, for your service to our Grand Lodge. I am looking forward to

working with you," said the Grand Master.

He directed the Grand Marshal to escort to the East the lodges with anniversaries: for their 200th anniversary, chartered in 1822, Saint Matthews Lodge; for their 225th anniversary, chartered in 1797, Olive Branch Lodge and Montgomery Lodge (certificate was presented on September 10th); and for their 225th anniversary, chartered in 1795, King Hiram's Lodge (this should have been presented in 2020, but was missed due to the pandemic).

The Grand Master directed the Grand Marshal to escort the Master, members, and District Deputy Grand Master for Rufus Putnam Lodge to the East where he authorized the production of a jewel to commemorate the event of their 100th anniversary. All lodges in the jurisdiction are allowed to petition the Grand Master for permission to commemorate their 100th anniversary with a jewel.

The Grand Master reflected on the many times he tried to bring Rt. Wor. Albert C Hopper, III to the East. The Grand Master mentioned that he had tried to call Rt. Wor. Bro. Hopper to the East twice before, but failed due to the pandemic and other circumstances. "But, third time's the

charm," he said before he presented his friend and worthy Brother the Henry Price Medal.

"I now have a presentation to a Brother who is a member of the Meadows Lodge and has been a faithful member of our Craft for over 25 years. He is the Past Commander, Land Component Command of the National Guard. One of his final assignments was when he was called to provide security at the White House after the insurrection on January 6, 2021, and command all the troops at the White

House," said the Grand Master. "Rt. Wor. Grand Marshal, you will conduct Brigadier General and Brother John J. Driscoll to the East." The Grand Master presented the Henry Price Medal to Brother Driscoll, BG (Ret). In his retirement as a Soldier for Life, Bro. Driscoll continues the mission by giving talks about Patriotism. Lodges, schools, or other organizations can request his presentation by contacting him at johndrisco@aol.com.

"Brethren, on June 15th, in an attempt to rescue a man

who had fallen from a bridge into the waters below, Bro. Robert Ljunggren, a Mason of 20 years and an off-duty firefighter was enjoying a day of relaxation on his boat before 'jumping into action'." Bro. Ljunggren saved a life that day, but avoided the spotlight at Grand Lodge. The Grand Master presented his First Responder Recognition to Rt. Wor. Micheal Leaonard, DDGM for the 23rd.

The Grand Master called Bro. Brian Cavanaugh of the H.E.L.P. medical equipment program to the East to present him with a recognition of service with "deepest respect and gratitude." H.E.L.P. supplies free medical equipment for the Commonwealth, other States such as

Kentucky, and internationally to countries such as Ukraine.

The 7th Masonic District hosted its 2nd Lodge of Instruction fundraiser hair cutting for the Brotherhood Fund in memory of Bro. Eric Wickberg, who died of ALS and was helped by the Brotherhood Fund. In attendance were the Brothers of the White Ash and Brothers of the Single Malt. Rt. Wor. Gordon M. Craig presented the Grand Master with a check for the Brotherhood Fund.

Norfolk Lodge, announced Wor. Jared LaLiberte from the

ed relief for many of our Brothers, their widows, and children. Thank you!"

In Shrine news, the Shriners Hospitals continues to treat children from Ukraine. Aleppo Shrine has assisted with transportation. Shriners International has direct contacts in countries all over the world.

The Grand Master provided an update on the Masonic License Plate revenue:

"Two thousand, seven hundred and eighty-five plates on the road as of July 27, 2022. Three thousand plates needed to reach our goal," the Grand Master announced. "At three thousand plates, the RMV sends \$60,000 per year to Grand Lodge for the benefit of our Charities!"

The Grand Lodge recently launched a new lodge self-assessment tool via MassMasons.org on April 8th. This tool is designed to allow lodge members to provide feedback and insight about their lodges. This will equip the Master and Wardens with a view of their members assessment and awareness about their lodge. This assessment at the lodge level provides each lodge with the ability to determine what it does and does not want to focus on, and it allows the Master or the Master-elect to get a summary view of the strengths upon which to build and identifies areas for improvement.

"However, the survey is only as good as the participation and feedback provided," warned the Grand Master. "If only a few respond, then their responses drive the evaluation, likely in the wrong direction. It is important that your voice is heard, and your input is received. Accomplish this by taking the survey, for each of your lodges. They will benefit from your opinions, insight, and experience. Every lodge is unique. All Masonry is local. This survey is open to all members. Please go on Massmasons.org to participate. Thank you."

The Grand Master is regularly questioned about "whether candidates' names need to be published in the notice for a lodge conferring degrees upon them. The answer is, strictly speaking, no. There is no constitutional requirement."

"However, placing the name in the notice for balloting is well defined. To clarify, the notice must be published prior to balloting and as good practice, dictates the names should be published until the degrees are complete, giving due notice and opportunity for members to object to advancement," said the Grand Master.

He then read a section of the Grand Lodge Constitutions, "as all of you who are Masters should be causing to happen at every one of your communications:

337 Politics, etc.: No political, sectarian, religious dogma, or other topics likely to excite personal animosities shall be introduced for discussion in any Lodge under this jurisdiction... or other topics likely to excite personal animosities covers it all."


friends now as Sisters and Brothers, having joined the same fraternal organization, and think back to just how lucky I was to be surrounded by such a wonderfully grounded extended family.

The Masonic Lite Podcast

It began simply enough, with a request to a few friends for suggestions on how to learn more about Masonry. As a teacher, I knew I would have off this summer, allowing me what I thought might amount to some time to read. Many of my esteemed Brothers responded with great ideas, including joining esoteric Masonic groups. One, however, led to an experience I never imagined, thanks to my Brother and friend, Rt. Wor. and Rev. Hank Pierce.

The Rev asked if I'd ever listened to the Masonic Lite Podcast. I had not. He had been a fan for some time, and mentioned that they are coincidentally based in Pennsylvania. I have relocated to PA, you see, so they must be close, right? The Keystone State (keystone - any Royal Arch Masons out there?) is larger than I realized, and I was

soon to find out in an interesting way.

I gave them a listen during my morning walk around the new neighborhood. The mountains, crisp air, and blue sky are usually my only company. Today was different. As I walked past Kilcoyne's Tavern, the Keystone Diner (Texas Wieners 5 for \$12), and Carmela's, whose Italian pastries would make anyone from Brooklyn homesick, it was like listening to old friends. They joke. They

kvetch. They offer simple solutions to complex problems. Their rapport is evident from the first minute. I found myself listening, laughing, and enjoying their discourse during what is otherwise just a walk. I knew other Masons needed to know and listen.

I could write an article for TROWEL magazine. That would get the word out to all Masons in Massachusetts. I hoped it would be okay with the hosts of the podcast, so I emailed them, explaining my thoughts. Much to my surprise, I was invited to be a guest on the podcast! I immediately set to work planning the trip and a list of talking points. It's the old Boy Scout—Be Prepared.

The drive to Ephrata was peaceful and picturesque, with mountains and blue skies all the way. As we got into Amish country, we saw our first horse and carriage on the same roadway as cars, which was a new one for me, akin to something out of a movie. Lititz is a short hop from Ephrata, and that's where we stayed. I had no idea that a classic car show was planned that same evening, which made the drive more entertaining than expected.



The Prodigal Mason

In 1858, Thomas Carlyle, a prominent English philosopher, essayist and historian, wrote the *History of Frederick the Second*. Frederick II, better known as Frederick the Great, was King of Prussia from 1740-1786. Frederick the Great was reported to have uttered a most famous quote during a campaign in the Silesian Wars in the mid-18th century. He noted his

troops were stronger than his enemy's, but not as strong as hunger and disease. Carlyle wrote that Frederick the Great said, "An army, like a serpent, goes upon its belly." Through the ages, this quote has come down to "An army marches on its stomach." Frederick the Great realized that the morale of his men depended on the food they were given. A well-fed soldier was a better soldier.

My father, Wor. John Thompson of St. Paul Lodge, told me stories about his service in the South Pacific during World War II, and more than a few were centered on meals. One of his favorite tales concerned breakfast. He said the eggs they were given were powdered and had no taste, and the bacon was packed in so much salt that you couldn't eat it. One day, they got a new mess Sergeant and they anxiously awaited breakfast. The new mess Sergeant solved the breakfast problem. He fried the bacon, crumbled it, and added it to the powdered eggs. My father said the powdered eggs suddenly had some flavor and the eggs cut the salt on the bacon. You could actually eat breakfast and the morale of the men shot up. He added that the mess Sergeant didn't last long. Some officer heard about him, so the Sergeant ended up at some headquarters.


I only mention food and armies because the same thing can be said about a Masonic lodge – "Lodge Officers do the degrees on their stomachs." Dinners have become big deals at lodge meetings. Things have changed. When I started my time as an Officer, some 47 years ago, dinners were an occasional treat, usually between the first and second sections of the Master Mason degree. Today, for most lodges,

The monthly dinner is an important part of lodge life and it may, with other efforts, actually help attract members to meetings and turn candidates into regular attendees. I am fond of saying, "In the lodgeroom, we perform ceremonies. In the banquet hall, we practice Masonry." It is in the banquet hall that we build friendships that can and normally do last a lifetime.

By the way, I didn't hear that saying or read about it anywhere, so I think it's mine. Feel free to use it. Maybe some time in the distant future, a Masonic writer will stumble upon this column and finally learn the origin of the saying. Some lodges are lucky. They have members who can cook meals for lodge meetings. Others have to rely on outside help. My lodge, Merrimack Valley Daylight, has outside help. Of course we don't have dinners. Since we normally open the lodge at 11am on the third Tuesday of the month, we have a luncheon. Our luncheons, however, actually look like dinners. They are meals from salad to dessert and everything in between.

As I said, we normally open at 11am. The opening drops to 10:30am on those days when something special is happening, like a visit from the District Deputy. But the start time isn't the most important time. We close the meeting at or before noon. It's a rare moment the closing is after noon. We try to close at or before noon because that is the time our chefs are planning to serve our meal. As I said, we have outside help to prepare our luncheons. In our case, it's mostly the wives of lodge members who prepare the meals. The captain of the crew of chefs is the wife of our Junior Warden, Susan Hicks. In the spirit of full disclosure, I should note Susan Hicks is my sister-in-law. When you look at Susan's crew, you can say it's the Eastern Star Chapter that resides in the Tewksbury Masonic hall, Acacia, that is cooking our meal. All of the chefs are members of that chapter.

Having Eastern Star members cooking meals is, I suspect, quite common in Massachusetts. I know Acacia Chapter cooks for Friendship Lodge in Wilmington and the Scottish Rite Valley of Lowell. But no matter who a lodge uses – its own members, the families of members, or outside Masonic groups – there's a meal waiting in the banquet hall. And Masons across the state can have dinner as they develop those friendships that last a lifetime. They can have dinner as they use the banquet hall to practice Masonry.


However, the brothers at Wilder Lodge decided to set up a college fund for Widow's children, then decided to have this ride, with proceeds from today to go to that fund.


Masonry, the Wells Family, and The American Optical in Southbridge

On Saturday, August 13, 2022, the Massachusetts Lodge of Research (MLOR) held its quarterly meeting at the Quinebaug Masonic Lodge in Southbridge. There was a presentation on the history of Quinebaug Lodge, and a quarterly meeting on the installation of new officers for the MLOR. The MLOR provided lodge members some literature on the Wells men and their Masonic past. The MLOR put out a challenge to our lodge members to do a little research on the history of Masonry in our community. After the meeting, a private tour of the Optical Heritage Museum in Southbridge was conducted. American Optical and the Wells family of Southbridge played an important part in the growth of one of Southbridge's industrial giants by becoming the world's largest manufacturer of eyeglasses during that time. It was during this period, 1830-1910, when industry in Southbridge grew along with Masonry.

Wor. George W. Wells, President of The American Optical Company from 1891-1912.

All three generations of the Wells men had proudly served the Masonic fraternity and their community. The American Optical Company was formed in 1869 when then owner, R.H. Cole and Company merged with H.C. Ammidown and Company. George W. Wells had started with the company as an apprentice at the age of 17. Within 10 years, George gained majority control of the company stock. In 1879, when R.H. Cole retired, George W. Wells was elected President of American Optical. Over the next 30 years, George developed and patented 26 different tools for splitting, cutting, and grinding lenses and milling spectacle frames. The company was thriving and in the 1890s, George's sons Channing, Albert, and Joel Cheney joined their father in running the optical business.

Two of his sons loved Freemasonry so much they progressed in the Fraternity to become Masters of the Quinebaug Masonic Lodge. Wor. Channing Wells was Master from 1902-1903. Wor. J. Cheney Wells was Master from 1907-1908. Their photos are hanging proudly with other Past Masters of the lodge. The three sons led the company as a unified team and after Wor. Bro. Well's death in 1912, his son Wor. J. Channing became president. In 1917,

when the Wells brothers purchased R.H. Cole's stock, they became the sole owners of American Optical. In 1936, George B. Wells, grandson of Wor. Bro. Wells, replaced his uncle Channing Wells as president of American Optical, keeping the company in family hands. The new president followed his grandfather's beliefs. -Bro. Jimmy Falzone



Grand Lodge Installs at Meridian

The Installation for the 225th year of Meridian Lodge, the last lodge chartered by M. Wor. Paul Revere, instituted December 11, 1797, was a special event. In attendance were M. Wor. Albert Timothy Ames, Senior Past Grand Master and Grand Secretary, as Installing Master, with his son Rt. Wor. Richard Ames (longtime stalwart of Meridian Lodge) as Marshall, and Rt. Wor. Edwin Charles Sloper as Chaplain. M. Wor. Bro. Ames served Meridian Lodge as Master in 1963-1964 and again 50 years later in 2013-2014. The Grand Master, M. Wor. Richard Maggio, along with four Past Grand Masters and forty-seven past and presiding Grand Lodge Officers and friends attended.

Wor. Ara Yogurtain was installed as Master of Meridian Lodge. He was presented with the Paul Revere gavel, a treasured possession of the lodge. This gavel was presented to the lodge in 1797 during its first installation of officers when the lodge was situated in Watertown, MA. The gavel

was lost, but found again. Each year it is presented to the incoming Master with strict instructions that it is for "display purposes only" and never to be struck.

Wor. Stewart Brandt, in commemoration of this august event, presented the lodge a set of ivory working tools, which were made over one hundred years ago to be added to our cherished collection of memorabilia. M. Wor. Bro. Maggio made complimentary remarks and challenged the lodge to continue its good work. He closed Meridian Lodge in ample form.

As well as being a Past Master of Rising Star Lodge in Stoughton, he was also Past Chaplain of St. John's Lodge # 57 F & AM of South Berwick, ME. Wor. Bro. Huggins contacted Rising Star Lodge and with the assistance of his son, Mark Giddings, presented the Past Master's Jewel and Masonic case to Wor. "Since the pandemic," the Grand Master continued, "harmony appears to be increasingly difficult to obtain. Each year, they are recognized as a leader in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts by the American Red Cross.

"In a collaborated effort between The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts CPR program and the United States Coast Guard," the Grand Master continued, "Operation CPR was kicked-off on May 9, 2022. Operation CPR is a joint mission between these two organizations to maintain and provide required CPR, AED, and First Aid Certifications for the men and women of the crews at USCG Station Boston. Under the direction of Rt. Wor. Robert F. Stanley, CPR Chairman at the Grand Lodge, they continue trainings for our Coast Guard personnel."

"The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts CPR Program is available for your lodge as well. Contact the Grand Lodge Service Department or your District Service Officer for assistance in setting up a program for your District or Lodge."



"Brethren, as we start a new Masonic year, I am starting to realize my term in the East of Grand Lodge is coming to an end soon. I have been honored to serve you. I thank all of you for your support, as we, together, worked to keep Freemasonry in Massachusetts alive and well during the pandemic."

Grand Masters Massachusetts

A Life of Service

The 42nd installment in the continuing series focused on our past Massachusetts Grand Masters.

The pillars of our Fraternity often have lives that span decades and stretch into a great number of organizations, activities, and events. This is patently true when looking at the long career of Most Wor. Donald W. Vose. He was a member of many Masonic and non-Masonic organizations, and his truly was a life of service.

M. W. Brother Vose was a part of a Masonic family. Both his father and grandfather were members of the Craft, associated with Columbian Lodge in Boston and Oriental Lodge in Edgartown, Martha's Vineyard These two lodges were the anchor points of his own association with blue lodge Masonry. Brother Vose received his degrees in Columbian Lodge in 1933, when the world was in the grip of the Great Depression. He was one of the few candidates raised in that period. He had come to the lodge from Curry College, where he studied theater arts, which served him well in the Fraternity, giving him confidence and skill in the performance of degrees.

Columbian Lodge had a two-year officer line. Brother Vose was appointed as Inside Sentinel in 1933, and he did not come to the Master's chair until 1948. During this period, he turned his attention to York Rite bodies, becoming a Royal Arch Companion in St. Paul's Royal Arch Chapter in 1938, a Super Excellent Master in Boston Council in 1942, and a Knight Templar in Boston Commandery in 1946. In 1939, he received the Scottish Rite degrees in the Valley of Boston. As Master, he distinguished himself both in the presentation of the degrees and the administration of the lodge, and was recognized by the Grand Lodge by being appointed a Grand Steward in 1950. A dozen years later he was appointed District Deputy Grand Master for the 1st Masonic District, but only served one year in that office because Grand Master A. Neill Osgood appointed him Deputy Grand Master in 1963. At the Feast of St. John, the Grand Master introduced Brother Vose as follows:

The Brother who was installed was raised thirty years ago in Columbian Lodge. He was its Worshipful Master in the two years of 1948 and 1949. The next year he appeared on the scene as Junior Grand Steward. At about that same time he also took up his work on the Board of Masonic Relief and has been on that Board twelve successive years. Last year he was District Deputy Grand Master. He is a member of the York Rite Bodies and also the Scottish Rite Bodies and, although he has given good service to the Grand Lodge, it has not been the lion's share of his time. That has been given elsewhere. He is now Generalissimo of St. Bernard's Commandery, Knights Templar, No. 12. He has been Ill. Commander-in-Chief of Massachusetts Consistory for the three years extending from 1958 to 1961. He was its leader during the time when it had its 100th Anniversary celebration. He is currently the Chairman of the Scottish Rite Advancement Program. He was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33°, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council, in September of 1960, and last year I had the pleasure of seeing him as the recipient of the DeMolay

Legion of Honor. He is all these things, an active Masonic member of the Fraternity, and yet when his Church needed a Superintendent for a Sunday School comprising over 900 teachers and pupils combined in the town in which I live, Wellesley Hills, he is the man who responded and said, "Yes." There seem to be no limits to his capabilities and his willingness.

He was already a hard-working and well-known Mason when he had the opportunity to address the Grand Lodge. In his remarks he said, in part,

In this world today there is great opportunity to go out and serve mankind...you have worked on the blood bank. Some of you have gone and spent hours and hours studying and giving forth ritual, taking young men by the hand and leading them into the Masonic Fraternity. There are those of you who have spent hours training young men in DeMolay. There are those of you who have gone forth with Boy Scouts. There are those of you who have been devoted to Church work. There are those of you who have walked on Sunday afternoon gathering money for the Community Chest, and this or that good work.

I suggest that you carry that on further and further and in some way point out to your Brethren outside of the Fraternity that you do this because as a Mason you enjoy doing it and because you are exhorted by each other to do so.

Then you will find that you are thinking better of yourself and of your opportunities to serve mankind. You are carrying out a little bit further the great work that was

drawn on the trestle board. You are carrying forth all to the good.

He believed very strongly that it was the mission of Masons to do these things and to be devoted to that life of service that the Fraternity recommends. His resume, already substantial, only grew during the next several years. He was active in the Grand Commandery of Massachusetts and Rhode Island, and on the Divan of Aleppo Shrine, A.A.O.N.M.S. After serving in the East of Grand Lodge, he took up the leadership position in each of those organizations.

From 1972 to 1974, he was Grand Master of Masons in Massachusetts, the sixth Past Master of Columbian Lodge to ascend to that office. It was a transformational time for Masonry, during a troubled time for our country. During his first year, 1972, he directed a program that created many publications for the general public, and he also reissued a ruling from 1939 forbidding gambling by lodges (including Beano, legalized in Massachusetts). During 1974, the Grand Lodge approved a change to the Grand Constitutions eliminating the jurisdiction of particular lodges over applicants. Since the earliest days of

Massachusetts Masonry, the Constitutions had directed that the lodge closest to an applicant's residence controlled his application, but as the committee reported, "In modern society with easy means of communication and instantaneous communication...the committee is of the opinion that the reasons originally validating territorial jurisdiction of Constituent Lodges no longer prevail." It had become an issue of paperwork, and this provision, along with a number of other outdated or unnecessary ones, were eliminated from the Grand Constitutions – the first major revision of the then-current edition (the 1953 edition). This was a matter of great import, and a credit to Grand Master Vose for advancing it.

As Illustrious Potentate of Aleppo Temple Shriners, Brother Vose directed the purchase of the property in Wilmington that became the new home for the Shrine. It remains a standout feature of the Shrine in Massachusetts to this day.

For many years during and after his Grand Mastership, Brother Vose welcomed many visitors to his home on Martha's Vineyard during the summer. It was said that if

you were invited once, you were welcome back any time afterward. M. W. Albert Ames, our senior Past Grand Master, spoke fondly of these visits. His first time was as Grand Marshal for M. W. Arthur Melanson in 1978. Brother Vose had a special guest room for the Grand Master when he visited.

In 1983, Past Grand Master Vose was very active in the 250th Anniversary celebrations, where he

famously brought the greetings of the many organizations to which he belonged – and also from the Edgartown National Bank, which he served as President. It became a standard greeting from him, and he repeated it when he attended the 275th Anniversary event in 2008.

In his later years, Grand Lodge, Columbian Lodge, and Oriental-Martha's Vineyard Lodge celebrated anniversaries for his membership in the Fraternity. Columbian Lodge had a memorable ceremony in 1993 for the 60th Anniversary.

Men of strong character attract both friends and rivals as they progress in any organization, but it is apparent that Brother Vose was admired and well-loved, and memory of his friendship and collegiality still bring smiles more than a dozen years after his death in 2009. He remained a fixture in the Fraternity well into his 90s, touching the lives of many of his Brethren and many of his fellow citizens. There are many Masons active today, including the author, who have fond memories of time spent with him.

His was a life of great service to the Fraternity and to society. As Grand Master Osgood said, there seemed to be no limits to his capabilities or his willingness. He truly lived respected and died regretted.

GRAND LECTURER

A s Grand Lecturers, we are asked many questions regarding words in ritual, ritual floor work, protocol, and just about anything related to Freemasonry. Since our last article, a few interesting questions have been asked.

Q: Is a Brother a Master Mason after his Third Degree Obligation?

- **A:** The answer is no. In the prior degrees, it would be true. But remember, you must be raised to the Sublime Degree.
- **Q:** How long does an edict of the Grand Master stay valid?
- A: The answer was found on our MassMasons.org page. (I suggest you visit this page often). By Massachusetts Grand Lodge tradition, an edict or ruling issued by the Most Worshipful Grand Master remains in force after his three year term of office, unless it is modified by another edict or ruling by one of his successors as Grand Master, or otherwise changed by formal action of the Grand Lodge. Therefore, these edicts and rulings are currently in effect.
- **Q:** Which way do the Cornucopias face when worn by the Stewards?

- **A:** The Senior Steward's horn faces left, and the Junior Stewards horn faces right. This sounds simple, but from what perspective? It is as you are looking at the Steward. The illustration and answer is found in the book *Duties and Responsibilities of Lodge Officers and Committee Chairmen*.
- **Q:** Does an application for the degrees need to be sponsored by a member of the lodge applied to?
- **A:** In short, no. The only requirement is that the sponsor is a member in good standing in our jurisdiction. However, it may be in the by-laws or a long tradition of a lodge that an applicant must be proposed by a member.

When a question arises, in most cases the answer can be found in these books. But, for that one word in ritual that has you questioning what it is, we have *The Book of Standard Work*. It is always in the Grand Lecturers' possession, to inform you of the right way or words, and we are happy to do so.

Overlook University: A Community of Lifelong Learners

The first day of school is a memory that lives with many of us in perpetuity. We remember having our fresh school supplies, textbooks that have yet to be opened, and a mind filled with questions. For Bro. Burt Goodrich and his wife Janet, this feeling returned to them upon their move to The Overlook, where they became residents in January, 2020. When the COVID-19 pandemic began, having only lived at The Overlook for a couple of months, they realized there were a myriad of questions about their new home they needed answers to, and they weren't alone. New friends and fellow residents shared this desire to learn about The Overlook. From things as simple as learning how to put in a work order with maintenance, to more complex questions such as learning the benefits of continuing care, Burt and Janet were acutely aware of the need for education.

It's not surprising the Goodriches were advocates for learning. Both spent their careers as educators, and their commitment to community and making an impact is palpable the moment you meet them. They got to work creating a list of questions that they took to the team at The Overlook with the suggestion of creating a program to educate residents. It was then that Overlook University was born. They started small with classes covering things like buildings and grounds, and culinary, but the popularity of the classes made it easy to increase programming and provide additional offerings, including speakers on resident-requested topics such as low vision. Now, there are consistently two classes a month and 65-75 people attend each one.

"The program has been so well received," said Executive Director Kristine Binette. "We even had a graduation this year, and everyone got matching Overlook University sweatshirts!" The decision to become residents at The Overlook was not one taken lightly by Burt and Janet. They looked at more than eight other communities before selecting The Overlook, which they loved for its beautiful campus and the comfort in knowing they can stay together even with changing levels of care. Burt calls himself a "share-holder" when discussing his commitment to the community.

"It dawned on us," he said, "that we are not renters of an apartment. We are shareholders in this enterprise. The management has been incredibly receptive to our feedback. That tells me they are shareholders along with us, which gives us comfort as well." "We came here to live a meaningful life with a sense of purpose," Janet remarked. As evidenced by the work she and Burt have already accomplished with Overlook University, we can't wait to see the ways that they and The Overlook make an impact next.

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
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MANOR OF SQUIRES FOR 9-11 YEAR OLDS
